American Elm (Ulmus Americana Princeton)



<u>Common Name(s)</u>: American Elm, Common Elm, Gray Elm, Soft Elm, Water Elm, White Elm

Height: 60'-80' Width: 30'-60'

Soil preference: Clay, Loam (Silt) or Sand

Light: Full sun to part shade - at least 6 hours sun

Moisture: Moist, well drained, but can tolerate some moderate drought and flood

Shape: Arching, Vase

<u>Notes</u>: Dark gray bark, gold/yellow leaves in Fall, deer resistant, attracts butterflies, pollinators, small mammals and songbirds.

Brandywine Red Maple (Acer rubrum 'Brandywine')



Brandywine is a cultivar of the red maple, *Acer rubrum*. It is the result of a 1982 US National Arboretum research project which crossed Acer rubrum *'October Glory'* and Acer rubrum *'Autumn flame'*

Height: 25'-35' Width: 15'-25'

Soil preference: tolerant of most soil types (loam, sand, clay)

<u>Light</u>: Full sun to part shade - at least 6 hours sun

Moisture: Moist, well drained, but can tolerate some moderate drought and flood

Shape: Rounded, upright

Notes: Silver/gray bark, Red/purple fall foliage, fast grower, no flowers, seeds or fruits

Chinese Pistache (Pistacia chinensis)



Common Names: Chinese Pistache, Chinese Pistachio

Height: 30'-35' Width: 20'-30'

Soil preference: Clay, Loam (silt), sand

Light: Full Sun- 6 or more hours of direct sunlight

Moisture: Prefers moist, well drained

Shape: Rounded, wider than tall

Notes: Grows medium/fast. Brilliant fall color.

Nuttall Oak (Quercus nuttallii)



Common Names: Nuttall Oak, Texas Red Oak

Height: 40'-80' Width: 30'-60'

Soil preference: Clay, loam (silt) and sand

Light: Full Sun

Moisture: Prefers rich medium to wet, well-drained soils. Drought tolerant once

established

Shape: Large, stately tree with narrow, rather open, rounded canopy

Notes: Highly adaptable to urban conditions and does well as a street tree. The acorns mature over 2 seasons and attract birds and small mammals and the tree is a larval host plant for moths and butterflies.

Grows: Perfect for urban conditions

October Glory Maple (Acer rubrum 'October Glory')



Common Name(s): Red Maple

Height: 40'-50' Width: 25'-35'

Soil preference: tolerant of most soil types, prefers slightly acid

Light: Sun or part shade- at least 4 hours of direct sun a day

Moisture: Prefers moist, well drained

Shape: Round

Notes: Grows medium/fast -13-24 inches a year. Brilliant orange/red leaves in Fall

Overcup Oak (Quercus-lyrata)



Common Names(s): Overcup Oak, Swamp post oak, Swamp white oak, Water white oak

Height: 35-60' Width: 35-60'

Soil preference: Clay, loam

Light: Full sun (6 or more hours of direct sunlight a day) or Partial Shade (Direct sunlight only part of the day, 2-6 hours)

Moisture: Good Drainage, Moist, occasional flooding or standing water

Shape: Broad and rounded

Notes: Plant this tree in low lying areas or along streams, rivers or ponds in full sun to partial shade. It can be used as a shade tree. As most native oak trees, this is a high-value wildlife plant. This tree is mildly resistant to deer browsing.

Serviceberry (Amelanchier x grandiflora 'Autumn Brillance')



Common names: Apple Serviceberry

Height: 15' – 30' Width: 25'-30'

Soil preference: Clay, loam or silt, sand, slightly acidic

Light: Full sun to part shade – at least 6 hours direct sun

Moisture: Prefers moist well drained

Shape: Round, sometimes multi-stemmed and shrubby

Notes: Fragrant attractive Flowers, edible fruit

Shumard Oak (Quercus shumardii)



Common Name(s): Oak, Shumard Oak, Shumard's Oak

Height: 70' Width: 40'

Soil preference: clay, loam or sand

Light: Full sun or part shade

Moisture: Moist, well drained, tolerates some drought and flooding

Shape: Pyramid when young, rounded with age

Notes: Fast growing, good for urban conditions, drought, red/burgundy Fall color

Magnolia (Magnolia virginiana 'Australis')



Common names: Beaver Tree, Castorwood, Small Laurel Magnolia, Small Magnolia, Swamp Magnolia, Swamp Sassafras, Sweetbay, Sweet Bay, Sweet Bay Magnolia, Sweet Magnolia, White Laurel

Height: 10' – 35' Width: 10'-35'

Soil preference: moist to wet, acidic, and organically rich soils. This species tolerates wet, swampy, and boggy soils

Light: Full sun to part shade - at least 6 hours direct sun

Moisture: Prefers moist occasionally wet

Shape: Columnar or vase shaped

Notes: dark green leathery leaves, fragrant flowers
