Summer Saviors: Top Tips to Keep Your Trees Thriving and Healthy

Are you aware Wilmington's growing zone was changed to 8B in 2023 due to warmer conditions? Growing zones, often referred to as hardiness zones, are geographical areas that categorize regions based on their climate conditions, particularly minimum winter temperatures. These zones help gardeners determine which plants are most likely to thrive in their specific

area.

Although the summer solstice falls on June 20th this year, in SENC the summer season for trees begins on May 1st. During the hot temperatures and potential drought conditions, it's vital to give your trees proper care to keep them healthy and vibrant.

Pointers to Help Your Trees Become the Envy of Your Neighborhood!

Watering: Deep watering is key, especially during hot days. This encourage deep root growth and water early or late to minimize evaporation.

Mulching: Apply organic mulch around the base to retain moisture, regulate temperature, and suppress weeds. Keep mulch away from the trunk. No volcano mulching!

Pruning: Lightly prune to remove dead or diseased branches, improve airflow, and shape the tree. Avoid heavy pruning to prevent stress.

Fertilizing: Use slow-release, balanced fertilizer if needed, but avoid during drought to prevent further stress.

Monitoring for Pests and Diseases: Keep watch for signs of pests or diseases and act early to prevent serious damage.

Adequate Air Circulation: Ensure trees aren't overcrowded to promote airflow and prevent disease. Prune surrounding vegetation if necessary.

Conservation of Water: Use drip irrigation or soaker hoses to water directly and conserve water.

Avoiding Soil Compaction: Protect against soil compaction by minimizing foot traffic around trees and using mulch.

Following these tips will help your trees thrive in Zone 8b's challenging conditions, enhancing your landscape's beauty and environmental health.
